# Offerings Community



# OUR STRUCTURE


## First United Methodist Church is “One Church” with “Multiple Expressions.”

Our structure is unique in the multi-site model of church growth in that we have a shared administration, yet we have empowered each community to live out our vision as appropriate for its context. Each community is empowered to develop plans for Worship, Grow, and Serve as appropriate for that community.

These decisions are made by the community leadership teams, which have been blessed by Lay Leadership and the Administrative Council.

Our Resource Leadership teams are whole-church teams made up of representatives from each of our current three communities. These teams are part of the shared administration of First Church and they look at how to advance our vision, mission, and values.



# FINANCIAL UPDATE


It is hard to believe a year has passed since I was last contemplating what to share with our Church family in Celebrations. In a time of great hardship for many, it was difficult to find a silver lining. Since the pandemic began in March 2020, we have endured a time like no other filled with heartache, a longing to be able to gather together again for worship and fellowship, and many other ups and downs. Yet, through it all, things that continue to come to mind are adaptation and faithfulness. From starting and stopping in-person worship to virtual VBS to many moving into online giving I continue to be left in awe of God's mercy and grace.

Despite the turmoil we have experienced during the pandemic, I can report that from a financial perspective the Church has weathered the storm even better than I could have imagined thanks to your faithfulness and generosity. We ended 2020 with much to celebrate from a financial standpoint. Every Community was able to finish the year at budget, or with a surplus to carry into 2021! What a blessing it has been to see the many ways our Church family has given financially, spiritually, and physically to support our communities.

In addition to your faithful giving and service, we were fortunate to receive a Payroll Protection Program (PPP) Loan in April 2020, which was part of the CARES Act. This loan provided a small, short term measure of financial stability and allowed us to continue to pay our hourly employees who were unable to work due to the closure. I have great news to report regarding this PPP loan: in March of this year, we received 100% forgiveness from the Small Business Administration! During these turbulent times, we have been able to maintain operations and a combination of virtual and in-person programming, continued to pay our apportionments, and maintained our commitment to our mission partners in Lexington and around the world at a time when the Church's presence is needed more than ever.

So, while we begin to return to some sense of normalcy, I can assure you we will continue to be vigilant, looking for ways to be good stewards of your tithes and offerings, recognizing that the future is still uncertain. # FINANCIAL MODEL

Every time you give to the budget, you are supporting five different areas:

## Community

50% of all that you give stays in your local worshipping community (Andover, Downtown, or Offerings) to be used for ministry in that setting.

## Whole-Church Administration

25% goes toward church wide needs. This includes our Church Administrator, Office Manager/Treasurer, and Administrative Assistant. This also includes our insurance, all of our printing and copying expenses, office supplies, the costs associated with Rokeby Hall, maintenance on our vans, and much more.

## Missions

10% goes immediately to our missions fund. The list of missions this fund supports is long and growing.

## Appportionments

11% goes to the Kentucky United Methodist Church to support our inter-connectional ministries. Some of the special ways these funds are used include support of ministries like Aldersgate Camp, Wesley Foundations on college campuses, and new church starts, along with a global evangelism effort and outreaches like Imagine No Malaria.

## Community and Leadership Development

4% goes towards funding new communities of First UMC and towards investing in both lay and clergy leadership through the Discipleship Intensive and First Church Fellows.

**In contrast to budget giving, 100% of every dollar you give in a special offering to a capital campaign goes to that specific purpose.**

# ENDOWMENT FOUNDATION

## **FIRST UNITED METHODIST CHURCH (FUMC) ENDOWMENT FOUNDATION, INC.**

Gifts that keep on giving year after year! The purpose of the Endowment Foundation is to enhance the mission and outreach of our Church beyond the annual operating budget and to oversee permanent funding coming from the lifetime gifts and bequests of our members.

### **FUMC Endowment Foundation 2020 support of church ministry!**

In 2020 the Foundation was able to approve and distribute funds to the church in the amount of \$112,229 for programs, activities and projects. Each fund has its own distinct policy for determining the distribution amount as a percentage of the fund's value. Since its inception, the Foundation has distributed \$1,085,192 back to the church. After an initial investment of \$356,000 in 2001, the generosity of our members and solid management by our investment committee, the Foundation portfolio has grown to \$1,540,950 by the end of 2020.


### **What do FUMC Endowment Foundation Funds Support?**

The Foundation invests the principal of gifts received as a permanent source of funds for programs, missions, scholarships, infrastructure, clergy housing, and other special needs at First Church. The funds are available annually from the income generated from the investments. The Church receives distributions from the 13 funds listed below.

- Church Needs Fund** – Critical church needs as a true emergency fund.
- Albin C. Whitworth Music Fund** – Music ministry.
- Judy Strickler Hoffman Memorial Fund** – Andover youth music and missions.
- Church History Fund** – Preservation and promotion of our Church history.
- Administrative Fund** – Foundation expenses.
- Mission Fund** – New or the expansion of existing outreach ministries.
- Nancy Roszell Stephen Ministries Fund** – Stephen Ministries program.
- New Communities Fund** – Training for and establishment of new worship communities.
- Scholarship/Fellows Fund** – Tuition support to seminarian students.
- Infrastructure Support Fund** – Critical church infrastructure in amounts of \$5,000-\$30,000.
- Bachmeyer-Stilz/Smith Parsonage Fund** – Housing for clergy appointed to the church.
- All Equities Church Fund** – Non-operational church purposes.
- Unallocated Asset Fund** – Undesignated gifts to support other specific funds to be determined.

Dear First Church,

I have wanted to avoid cliché as I write this note, but I also haven't been able to escape saying, "Words are not enough." I've started several versions, but none have adequately described my gratitude to you or the influence of this church in my life.

If you've been around for a while, you've surely heard me quote our baptismal vows. Whenever I have opportunity to share my testimony, it begins with those vows and how my parents and my church upheld them. Nearly forty years ago, the people who made up First UMC pledged to surround me with a community of love and forgiveness, that I would grow in my trust of God and be found faithful in my service to others. They pledged to pray for me, that I would be a true disciple who walks in the way that leads to life. Though most of you weren't here to take those vows on that day, the people of First UMC have upheld them ever since.

Along with my family, this church family has been my place of deepest community. I've had the unusual privilege of being a member here who was also allowed to be a pastor, but I've always considered myself a member first. And as difficult as leaving pastoral ministry has been, leaving First Church as a member has been harder. You have cared for me and my family so well. I was always afraid that my kids might grow up to tell stories about how hard it was to be a "pastor's kid." Instead, they've grieved leaving our church—and even leaving the role of "pastor's kids"—as much as I have. Thank you for truly surrounding us with a community of love and forgiveness.

This has been the place that has taught me how to serve others and the place of my richest growth in discipleship. It was in the youth group here—going to the United Methodist Children's Homes and the Florence Crittenton Home—that I learned the importance and joy of serving others. It was also in the youth group here that I was encouraged to lead in ministry and had some of my most profound encounters with God. Those experiences have continued in my time on staff here. Alongside you, through ministries like Room in the Inn, I've continued learning the importance and joy of serving others. With the encouragement of many of you, and especially Al Gwinn, Paul Brunstetter, Mike Powers, and Todd Nelson, I've continued to have new opportunities to lead—from the start of Offerings as a new worship service, to our move to a new campus, to the development of our fellows and interns programs. Those opportunities were more than I could have imagined when I first came here as youth minister 17 years ago. Thank you for giving me your trust, your encouragement, and your prayers along the way.
